2. Superimposed upon the economic and mood shifts are basic differences in class values. These are far from absolute, but as a rule of thumb, working-class people have been more likely to hold values centered on cooperation, sharing, equity, fairness, and justice than have their affluent countrymen. The latter have, throughout our history, been more likely to defend the marketplace as the sole determinant of the distribution of the economy's fruits. So long as the marketplace economy provided reasonable opportunities, the poor were likely to accept it. But during hard times or when madistribution was especially evident, working-class people have tended to call for community or government action to suppplement—or counteract—the marketplace. In short, they have believed that morality ought to have a role in the workings of the economy.
