- Arthur Barlowe and Thomas Harriot were English explorers between the latter half
 of the sixteenth century and the beginning of the seventeenth century. Even though
 Thomas Harriot accompanied Arthur Barlowe in the 1584 English expedition to the
 new land of America, they held very different attitudes towards the Native
 Americans. Compare the following two passages and illustrate how their attitudes
 are different. 25%

[T]hey [the inhabitants of Secotan—Native Americans] wondered marvelously when we were among them at the whiteness of our skins, ever coveting to touch our breasts, and to view the same. Besides, they had our ships in marvelous admiration, and all things else were so strange unto them [that] it appeared that none of them had ever seen the like. When we discharged any piece, [. . .] they would tremble thereat for very fear, and for the strangeness of the same, for the weapons which [they] themselves use are bows and arrows, [and] the arrows are but [made from] small canes, headed with a sharp shell or tooth of a fish, [though] sufficient enough to kill a naked man. Their swords [are] of wood, hardened; likewise they use wooden breastplates for their defense. They have besides a kind of club, on the end whereof they fasten the sharp horns of a stag or other beast. [. . .] --Barlowe, The First Voyage Made to the Coasts of America (1589)

Most things they saw with us—[such] as mathematical instruments; sea compasses; the virtue of the load-stone in drawing iron; a perspective glass guns; hooks; writing and reading; spring-clocks that seem to go of themselves; and many other things that we had—were so strange unto them, and so far exceeded their capacities to comprehend the reason and means how they should be made and done, that they thought they were rather the works of gods than of men, or at the [least] they had been given and taught [to] us [by] the gods. Which made many of them to have such [an] opinion of us, that if they knew not the truth of God and Religion already, it was rather to be had from us whom God so specially love, than from a people that were so simple, as they found themselves to be in comparison [with] us. Where-upon greater credit was given unto that

[which] we spoke of, concerning such matters.
