

Survey: Men see doctors, but not often enough

all it happy-go-lucky confidence or pure, unspoken terror: Only 60 percent of adult males have had a basic physical exam in the past year, compared with 76 percent of women, a recent survey shows.

Even worse, 10 percent of the nation's tough guys haven't had a physical in more than 10 years, or "since the Reagan administration," says Mike Lafavore, editor of

Men's Health magazine.

Conducted for the magazine and CNN, the national survey of 1.017 adults 18 and older focuses on how often men see doctors and on their interest in nutrition, family history, prevention, stress, and sun and skin care.

Men proved more likely than women to worry about some things - colon cancer, AIDS, liver disease. But in most health ar-

In most health areas, study says, men lack the knowledge women have

eas, they were less knowledgeable than women, and they were less likely to think family health history important.

Other findings:

- Men older than 50 are more likely to feel they are "in control" of their health, pay attention to it and see doctors. The most carefree of all are the youngest, the Generation X-ers, often yet to be tested for medical problems.
- Men are much more likely than women to have an unhealthy body mass index of more than 25. (The body mass index calculates the weight-to-height ratio and assigns a number to the result. It used to be that a

BMI of 27 was considered overweight. But a recent federal study lowered it to 25.)

Silence is not golden when it comes to a man's family health history, though that may be changing: Middle-age and young men are more likely to have spoken with their fathers about family health than older

▶ Men generally don't worry about their skin, or the possibility of skin cancer, though the number of skin cancers is skyrocketing.

Men are more likely than women to

have a drink to reduce stress.

A free "Men's Maintenance Manual" booklet recaps prevention basics from diet to stress, sex and even keeping handsome (don't smoke, eat lean, use sunscreens). Mom wants inmates off Web

CRIME: The mother of a murder victim also seeks to educate the public about prisoners' Internet access.

SALIDA — As Janice Keson scanned a World Wide Web page, she was shocked to see the names of her daughter's killers, seeking pen pals on death row.

Now Keson and her husband, Mark, are campaigning to ban Internet access by inmates and educate the public about the practice.

Keson was looking one day at a Web page for James A. Heard, who includes names and addresses for fellow prison inmates at his site. Gerald Cruz and James Beck, her daughter's killers, were among the names listed.

Eight years ago, Beck and Cruz stabbed Darlene Paris, 23, and three of her friends to death at a Salida duplex.

On his Web site, Heard makes a plea for Internet correspondence.

"We want to dispel the myths about incarcerated people and create meaningful, friendly correspondence," he writes. "We are real people with hopes, fears and feelings. We all are human beings!"

Victims' and prisoners' rights groups, as well as the California Department of Corrections, say it is difficult to track online activity by inmates. State prison officials explain that some inmates have access to computers but cannot go on the Internet or send and receive E-mail. It takes a third party on the outside to establish an Internet link.

Charles Sparks of Cleveland, Ohio, is one of those facilitators. He created "Penn-Pals" in 1996 as a component of the Prison Inmate Services Network.

"I'm very proud that I've done this," Sparks said

Inmates can mail photos and information to post on Sparks' site, then online visitors can get the prisoner's postal address. More than 1,200 inmates have signed up.
